

CST 101 LIFE AND DIGNITY OF THE HUMAN PERSON

A discussion guide from the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops and Catholic Relief Services

OPENING PRAYER: Together, pray, “Prayer for Life and Dignity.”

WATCH: “CST 101: Life and Dignity of the Human Person” on YouTube.

PRAY WITH SCRIPTURE:

Read this Scripture passage twice.

Invite participants to reflect silently after it is read the first time.

“Then God said: Let us make human beings in our image, after our likeness. Let them have dominion over the fish of the sea, the birds of the air, the tame animals, all the wild animals, and all the creatures that crawl on the earth.

God created mankind in his image;
in the image of God he created them;
male and female he created them.” (*Genesis 1:26-27*)

SHARE:

Every person is made in God’s image.

- In whom is it easy to see God’s image?
- Are there people who you struggle to believe are made in God’s image? Why?

REFLECT ON TRADITION:

Read these passages aloud.

“Every individual, precisely by reason of the mystery of the Word of God who was made flesh (*cf. John 1:14*), is entrusted to the maternal care of the Church. Therefore every threat to human dignity and life must necessarily be felt in the Church’s very heart; it cannot but affect her at the core of her faith in the Redemptive Incarnation of the Son of God, and engage her in her mission of proclaiming the Gospel of life in all the world and to every creature (*cf. Mark 16:15*).”
